Directions to the Hail and Farewell at Fort Myer in Arlington, Virginia:

Traveling South on I-495 towards Virginia:

Exit at Arlington Blvd./Route 50 going east towards Arlington (Exit 8 East).

Continue on Route 50 for several miles.

Finally you will see a sign that says "N. Rhodes Street/N. Rolfe Street/N. Queen Street".

Bear right to take that exit off of Route 50 and go straight for a few blocks.

At the stop sign, make a right onto N. Meade Street.

At the end of N. Meade St, make a right onto Marshall Drive and enter the base at the Wright Gate.

Ask the Gate Sentry for directions to the Officer's Club.

Traveling East on 1-66:

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Proceed until you pass the Key Bridge exit.

Shortly thereafter you will go through a well-lighted tunnel for approximately 500 feet.

After the tunnel bear right and take the next exit Pentagon/Hwy 110.

Once on Hwy 110 make the first right exit, Marshall Drive (approximately 1000 ft.).

Be cautious: it comes up quickly and it is sharp!

Follow Marshall Drive up the hill (approximately 750 feet) to the Wright Gate of Ft. Myer.

Ask the Gate Sentry for directions to the Officer's Club.

NOTE: Everyone in the vehicle will be required to show a current government-issued form of identification (such as a drivers license, passport, or the like). Also be prepared to show the vehicle registration.

Historic Harbors Host Holiday Boat Parade of Lights Weekend

Saturday, December 7 & Sunday, December 8

The historic Potomac River lights up when the Alexandria Convention & Visitors Association, the Georgetown Business Improvement District, and the Southwest Waterfront Association jointly host the Washington area's annual Holiday Boat Parade of Lights Weekend.

More than 50 brightly lit boats will stretch two miles along the Potomac River for the colorful parades. Events begin Saturday afternoon, December 6, at Alexandria's waterfront and culminate Sunday evening, December 7, at Washington Harbour in Georgetown. There will be collection boxes for Toys for Tots at each location.

Alexandria's Saturday waterfront events begin at 3:00 p.m. with music and refreshments at the marina behind the Torpedo Factory Art Center. Many of the Torpedo Factory artists will be holding special holiday shows with gift items. The parade begins at 5:30 p.m. and follows a route that will take it to Washington Channel by 7:00 p.m.

Georgetown's Sunday festivities kick off with a Winterfest celebration at Washington Harbour, located at 3000 K Street, NW. Refreshments, caroling, a visit from Santa and other family activities will be held from 4:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the docks of the harbour, followed by viewing of the Holiday Boat Parade of Lights beginning at 5:00 p.m.

The ACVA is coordinating boat participation. Representatives appointed by each of the three hosting organizations will judge their corresponding local parade. 
A House on the Water: Inspiration For Living at The Water's Edge

This book, just released by Taunton Press, does a lot to restore the luster of a dream that was severely drenched by Hurricane Isabel. In 218 gorgeous full-color pages, writer/architect/sailor Robert W. Knight lets us inside 23 terrific houses. Only one is near the Chesapeake, but it's great fun to visit Maine, California, South Carolina, Wisconsin, even Montana. (Yes, Virginia -- there IS navigable water without tide tables!)

Knight has studied how boats sit in the water -- it's reflected in his approach to homes and their design. (He also co-wrote The Very Small House -- which seems to take many ideas from The Pretty Big Boat.) Houses fit their sites beautifully; he admires a "quiet fit" into the landscape. Most plans are "traditional" but none are dull.

Décor ranges from Great-Grandma's antiques to Little Billy's bunk beds. These a dream houses, but they're all realistic. You can easily imagine moving in, because you can mentally walk around in every house.

A copy of A House on the Water WILL be featured in the Hail & Farewell's Silent Auction, if I can get over a severe case of House Lust by then. If you don't put in a winning bid, the book would make a dandy Christmas present at \$34.95 at your nearest bookstore.



1421: The Year the Chinese Discovered America

Gavin Menzies, a retired submarine commander with the British Royal Navy, has written a facinating book on the history of navigation and charting.

In 1421 the third Ming Emperor sent out a huge fleet to colonize and chart the planet. The main vessels were "treasure ships," teak junks, 480 feet long by 250 feet wide, with compartmentalized hulls. By the time what remained of the fleet returned to China, they had charted the east and west coasts of Africa and the Americas, the facing coasts of Baffin Island and Greenland, the top of Russia, and the upper half of Austraila.

I thought it was a great book!
