Boating Safety Certificate Required!

If you operate a D.C. registered boat (SCOW boats are) in D.C. waters, you must have passed a nationally recognized boating safety course. Also, in Maryland if you were born on or after 1972, then before operating a boat in Maryland waters you must have passed a nationally recognized boating safety course.

You should carry a copy of the boating safety wallet size card of certificate with you when operating a SCOW boat in the river.
