In July we look forward to continuing many of the current activities, namely social sails, Friday night raft-ups and other ad hoc events; I note that there was a bay raft-up planned for the 4th of July weekend. Get together with friends and enjoy the opportunities this club provides!

On the training front I note that we will be having the ever popular (and sold out) capsize course on July the 10th (there still is space in the August 21st class) and the (sold out) Summer Cruiser class will begin on July 14th.

On the business front, this July we hope to address a contentious issue which is the subject of much controversy, namely the issue of small craft advisories and developing a PFD policy. John Rogers sent all the skippers a questionnaire via email which hopefully many of the skippers responded to. We look forward to our monthly membership meeting speaker, Kip Louttit to shed some further insight. This is a difficult issue to address because we need to balance the club's need to protect its members (many of whom have varying amounts of expertise in boat handling), the fleet and the club's liability exposure with the members' desire to go sailing on those days that seem so ideal when the wind is heavier than normal. We will try to shape a PFD policy which balances the need to survive the warmer weather (heat stroke) balanced by safety considerations. We invite you to participate in this process.

Soon we will take up the issue of nominations. The elections take place in November, but it's never too early to start. This is a volunteer run organization -- many of you enjoy the benefits of others' efforts, and hopefully some of you will step up and become officers and directors to help us continue this mission. In conjunction with the elections we anticipate a series of amendments to the current bylaws; among other issues, clarifying that elections can be done electronically to save the club the unnecessary expense and effort associated with the mailing ballots.

Recently the skipper director, Amy Hasslacher has resigned her role. We thank Amy for her past contributions. Thankfully we had member step forward to fill the void, and I would like to introduce Dan Sandhaus as our new skipper director. *(continued on the next page)*

We look forward to our continued association and thank you in advance or in arrears for your kind efforts in helping further the objectives of SCOW, namely:


