Commodore – Order of the Month

Hello Friends and fellow club members. March has been a very busy month. In fact, counting the seminars, Re-up Brunch, Maintenance Day, and a General Membership, Train the Trainer, Boat Asset Committee, and Training and Skipper Certification Committee meeting, on average, there was a SCOW meeting every third day this month! Many thanks go out to all those who arranged and supported all these meetings. Well done!

Things do not slowdown in April. There is Rub-off-the-Rust, Social Sail and racing season all get started in April.

Rub off the Rust – April 2 (3rd rain date) 0900 to 1500 Hrs. Small Boat Dock Meetup, where we will form Scot and Cruiser teams.

Teresa Fralish is planning her program to help you skippers “git yer sea legs back!” as well as relearn what you may have forgotten.

A few reminders:

--The Scot portion is split into two separate sessions that will cover the same material: one morning (9AM-Noon) and one afternoon (Noon-3PM) session. However, the cruiser session is one 9AM-3PM session, since the procedures are longer for cruisers and there are variations between Rebecca and Hiatus. At 9AM, the cruiser participants will be divided into 2 groups for the 2 boats, and they will switch around noon. THIS COULD HAPPEN TO YOU.

While it is not uncommon to see a sailboat heeled over a bit, there are some cases where it can go too far, as in this real life photo. Nobody was hurt and Selkie’s passengers that day were wearing PFDs as was noted by emergency officials who assisted the boaters.



Of particular interest is the location of the centerboard. Since bringing the Scot back upright involves putting weight on a fully extended centerboard, if it retracts into the trunk, as it did in this case, the Scot cannot be righted without assistance of a power boats. In this case, the boaters called Julian Mallet and he was able to right them using the skiff. This was very fortunate for these sailors and can’t be relied upon in the case of a future capsized or grounding.

SCOW members using SCOW boats are subject to very expensive towing charges in the case of capsizing or grounding. SCOW has a group BoatUS membership that allows SCOW members a discounted towing protection package. But, this is an annual purchase for the individual skipper and must be purchased in advance to a tow in order to be covered for reimbursement. A fresh water policy with membership costs about \$70 per year. If you are interested, contact BoatUS and tell them you are a member of the Sailing Club of Washington.
