2020 Skipper Counts

As of July 31, we have 111 individual skippers certified for 2020, up 4 from a month ago. 101 of them are Scot skippers and 51 are cruiser skippers, while 41 are certified for both. In 2019 we had a total of 133 individual skippers.

A Couple of Capsizes

Two SCOW skippers with single crew members have capsized this season. The first incident involved Caroline while tacking down the Four Mile Run Channel into a brisk and gusty south wind. The skipper had the main sheet cleated and capsized immediately after a tack when hit by a formidable gust. He commented that the capsize was seemingly instantaneous.

Lesson Learned: In breezy/gusty conditions a cleated mainsheet can be perilous! Had the skipper been able to play out the mainsheet in concert with the gust, he and crew probably would have stayed dry.

The second incident involved *Elise* getting slammed by a forceful pop-up squall while sailing in the lagoon. The skipper saw the fast approaching squall, approaching form ESE, but was unable to get to the docks before it hit and wisely headed to the center of the lagoon to ride it out, recognizing the dangers of the leeward shore. The skipper was over-matched by wind gusts over 30 knots which arrived with torrential rain.

Lessons Learned: Head to the docks sooner seems obvious - but observers noted they'd never seen a pop-up storm develop so quickly at WSM. Perhaps anchoring in place with doused sails would have prevented the incident - but trying to get the anchor to hold in silt against very strong force could have resulted in an unwanted tangle with the lee shore. Perhaps heaving-to and reefing the main could have been helpful. Raising the board most of the way would have been helpful, along with flogging/trimming the main and jib in an effort to stay pointed somewhat upwind. In both incidents the skipper and crew were wearing PFDs. Both skippers handled the situation with calm and diligence and complied with SCOW procedures for incident reporting.
