### SKIPPER'S CORNER

November 29 was a fine day to sail. A very light breeze in the early afternoon built slowly to about 8 knots out of the south. PRSA had about 22 Lasers out racing while Laurie and I on Luna were joined for a scrimmage by Scott McConnell single-handing his freshly polished Adios and by Bonnie Sylwester and Joan Olmstead sailing Caroline. We started at G7 and went to HP Junction and back. As the breeze filled in it was joyful sailing. SCOW and PRSA member Jim Klein, serving on the race committee for the Lasers, counted about 30 sailboats out on the river from WSM. This is all to say there are probably some more gem-like sailing days ahead of us before the harshness of winter sets in. The water, however, is really cold - so please remember the SCOW mandatory-PFD policy and respect the weather conditions. Also, the jet aircraft traffic is way down due to COVID, so the wingtip vortex frequency is also reduced. That said, Scott saw one yesterday and his eyes were wide while describing it. As the planes are unusually spaced out, it is much easier to traverse beneath their flight path and stay out of harm's way.

### **2020 Skipper Counts**

As of November 30, we have 118 individual skippers certified for 2020, unchanged from a month ago. 106 of them are Scot skippers and 55 are cruiser skippers, while 42 are certified for both. In 2019 we had a total of 133 individual skippers.

A few highlights from the evening:

### Elli Abramson Award

This award is named for the late Elli Abramson (for whom our boat Ms Elli is named). Elli served as Commodore twice, was active in the training program, and also wrote much of the training material we still use today. Established in 1992, it is awarded annually for outstanding service to the club over an extended period. The 2019 recipient is **Dave Beckett** .

### Al Blankfield Award

This award is named for the late Al Blankfield, who served the club in many capacities, including Commodore, and is recalled by his friends in the club as someone who was "always there" when something needed doing. Established in 1994, it is awarded annually for outstanding service to the club during the past year. **Dana Howe** took this honor.

### **Woodie Woodside Award**

Established in 2009, in memory of Robert Custer "Woodie" Woodside, CDR USN (Ret), 1920-2009, one of the founders of SCOW and awarded annually to the member who has done the most to promote sailing by sharing his/her love of sailing through example, mentoring and service to the club. This time around, this prize was awarded to **Joe Leoncio**.

The Nominating Committee extends a warm welcome to the incoming 2021 Board of Directors and a heartfelt THANK YOU to the outgoing officers and directors. Special thanks to **Richard Kaiser** who served as Commodore in what will surely go down in SCOW history as a most difficult year.

### SAILING MEMORIES

It was winter in the early 1980's. We were in Florida for warm weather and the Southern Ocean Racing Conference (SORC). The yard was a beehive of activity and filled with some of the fastest, most cutting-edge sailing machines I had ever seen. We noticed a forty-something boat in the slip near us and marveled at its mast height which was festooned with side stays, check stays, spreacher blocks and other hardware I couldn't name. Lots of sail area hung from a mast that looked like a noodle

We went out that day and found the wind was up and the 6-8 foot seas had a very short crest-to-crest ratio, making for a lumpy ride. When we got back that evening, the forty-something marvel was looking forlorn with its mast folded at a spreader. The next morning she was standing proud and tall with a new mast and tuned rig. Later, I caught word of the cost -- the rigger/mast supplier was very proud of his achievement.

Fresh from a season of college wrestling I was wondering how it was that I was among this crew of sailing rock stars on this 57' gold plated racing machine. It was then that I was introduced to the coffee grinder winch: a medieval looking device designed to quickly make crew tire and whine. As we maneuvered for the start, I saw **Dennis Conner, Ted Hood** and **Tom Blackaller** -- all on other boats before the start. Pinch me, this was the big leagues!

We had a good start for about 300 yards. Then the main ripped just below the first reef points. We reefed quickly and stayed in the hunt. Twenty miles later the Genoa ripped at the lifelines. We switched to the "Blast Reacher," a high clew sail just a little smaller than the Genoa. Still with good speed we sailed on.
