DISCOVERIES ON THE BAY PART ONE OF A TWO PART SERIES

I haven't day sailed on the Bay since 2003 so I was looking forward to day sailing from Selby Bay Sailing Center in 2018. Best time to bring a boat to Selby Bay is before the Summer Solstice. Since the sailing center is owned privately I was able to get a pro-rata share of the annual slip fee for two weeks.

Both day sails in 2018 were with Andrew Price who has been sailing/racing with me for two years. Actual winds of 5-7 mph for our first sail in mid-June got us to Turkey Point and back, about one and a half miles from the sailing center. Turkey Point is at the end of peninsula that juts out into the South river. Many beautiful mansions along the shore; they were spared when the Hurricane Isabel came up through northern VA in 2003 as a tropical storm. On June 30 it was 93 degrees at the sailing center, but at Thomas Point Lighthouse it was only 84. We were blessed with 9-11 mph winds passing Turkey Point powering the boat along at about 6 kt; it felt so cool we decided to sail off Thomas Point Park (not the Lighthouse).

Sailing on the Bay in a Scot for the first time I found it sailed much better than a Lightning which is the same length.

The Scot easily cuts through waves of a foot -normal chop — and heels less. The Lightning pounds when hitting waves and heels more, requiring constant attention. As we arrived back at the dock **Dave Beckett** and his wife were preparing to leave for a 10 nautical mile sail on the Bay. Wow!

Trailer light problems prevented me from sailing in the Summer Solstice in 2019 so I was determined to day sail again. Winds on Aug 31 picked up to 12 mph from SE. This was just glorious as we cut through the chop going at least 7-8 kt on a reach to Thomas Point Lighthouse. From that position the Bay looked so vast and our boat so small. What a contrast with the Potomac -- 7 of the 9 Wednesday races in July and August were canceled due to one weather factor or another. **Esther Massey** who has also crewed for me in races was with us and Andrew took pictures. This turned out to be the best day sail I have ever had. Andrew told me it was the best day sail he has ever had.
