Practice Your Knots





COUCH SAILING

I usually subscribe to the notion of real personal interaction over anything my cellphone has to give me. Because of some acquired personal time this year I have found myself looking for a sailing game for my phone. I have searched the digital seas and have come up with one that is most like our Wednesday night racing: <u>Virtual</u> <u>Regatta Inshore</u>. I have found it to be the most popular, least glitchy and able to sail without paying any money or blood.

VR Inshore has daily regattas that last 24 hours and are almost always three to five races scored. You can do a hundred races in a day but only the top races will be scored. I would say three quarters of the people racing are active sailors. The game is available on iPhone, Android and PC. Gameplay controls are a little slow for the serious video game crowd, but the game is supposed to be a tactical challenge, not teach you how to sail.

The one main difference from real sailing rules is the protest, there is none. Time and opportunity are thrown out the window in favor of not sticking your nose where it does not belong. The computer judges interactions and makes the calls very well. When you do foul someone, the computer will show you the rule you broke and slows your boat down for seconds while you suffer for your ignorance. Not once have I witnessed the computer make a bad call.

The first race of every regatta the game gives you all the help for free. Help comes in the form of the computer steering the boat to velocity made good (VMG), wind forecast, time to the line and it will show you the wind shadows. After the first race, it's up to you to choose the help you need or want. I recommend only using the VMG because the others are almost useless and they cost credits. There are two rewards for racing, a blue credit and a green credit. The blue credit is only good to change the look of your boat and the green credit is for use on the racing helps. The blue ones are worthless and the green ones are a big help. You can always enter your credit card and buy credits, but it's not really needed.

ANNAPOLIS YACHT CLUB, EASTPORT AND EVEN THE PRESTIGIOUS VIENNA SAILING CLUB ALL HAVE ONLINE TEAMS AND RACES.

VR Inshore is a great racing trainer because of the realism. Wind shadows, strong winds and course corrections are all part of winning the game. There are little and huge wind shifts to keep everything fair. Downwind some boats have spinnakers and some do not. One tip I have learned with this game is the downwind velocity made good angles change with wind speed. I've been in a boat for years and that never really clicked until I played on my phone.

Annapolis Yacht Club, Eastport and even the prestigious Vienna Sailing Club all have online teams and races. There is a slightly steep learning curve to the game play but after five or six races anyone can get the hang of it. Playing the game is a good way to learn the rules and nuances of the sport in a safe environment free from mistakes. Even if you sail in San Diego Bay doing the one hundred race schedule, you won't get as much helm time. I will warn you about an extremely smart and good looking guy who only sails orange boats. He is nasty aggressive before the start.
