Class Registration Rules:

- 1. You must be there in person or have someone there representing you.
- 2. You must be a SCOW member to sign up for SCOW training.
- 3. You must pay for the course at the time of registration payable by check or cash.
- 4. If the classes are full, you can be put on a waiting list, but no payment will be taken.
- 5. No refunds. If you cannot take the class for any reason, we will assist you in finding a replacement. The monetary exchange is between you and the replacement.

VICE-COMMODORE LOG -- SCOW ANNUAL WINTER SAIL 2006

This year, our annual winter sail took place in the Grenadines from February 3 to February 11. There were 19 souls on three Lagoon catamarans chartering from Sunsail in St. Vincent. Tom Beachem with first-mate Bobby Phillips were on vessel Buccin FF, John Rogers was with first-mate Jack Schwartz on vessel Someday is a Diamond. Bob Soule was with me as first-mate on vessel Requin. We were told by Sunsail's manager at the pre-sail briefing to start with one reef on the main, and to expect winds of up to thirty knots with big rollers. It sure was windy, and our on-board instruments indicated 15 – 25 knots.

During our trip, we sang the lyrics: Yoo-ho-ho, the winds blow free. Oh for the life of a rolling sea

The first day after our boat was ready, we took a relatively short ride to Bequia, where our provisions team went shopping and picked up more local fresh produce while we anchored at Admiralty Bay south of Princess Point.

The second day we made a mad dash with full steam (full sail that is) for a five-hour journey to Tobacco Cays,



where part of the film "Pirates of Caribbean" was made. We enjoyed two days of hiking on the islands and snorkeling at the most beautiful coral reefs. There were a few Nemo sighting reported.

We hit Palm Island the next day, enjoyed the beach and then headed to Mayreau where we hiked up the hill to the Mayreau Catholic Church and enjoyed the sunset. On the way back, we stopped at their brand new internet cafe and restaurant, where we enjoyed a wonderful meal of tasty local fish and chicken. The next day, we stopped at Union Island to replenish our water supplies and empty our trash. Later that evening, we had a beach dining experience at the venue Shark Attack, north end of Union Island. Well, as it turns out even our mighty Requin (another name for shark) failed to protect us from the land counterpart that devoured our lobster and fish, and most of the money from our billfold. The land sharks left us leftover BBQ chicken, but we had to bring our own utensils and beverages. They had truly lived up to their name.

After we recovered from the Shark Attack, we headed to Canouan Charlestown Bay where we picked up a mooring ball, had lunch and had shore leave. The locals were helpful - they picked up the mooring balls, placing their little speedboat squarely in front of us, and then smoothly handed the ball to our crew so that we did not need to exercise our boat-hooking skills. In return, a ten dollar bill flowed smoothly out of our pocket to theirs. I was proud to be the skipper that day and support the local economy. Later, we headed north to Corbec Bay for some snorkeling, where we found ourselves visited by some gentleman of fortune (see picture). With outstanding diplomatic skills, cunning minds, and muscle, we finally ended up with their treasure trove. But unfortunately, we could not save Captain Tom from walking the plank.

We headed back to Bequia the next morning, and anchored again at Admiralty Bay where we had shore leave and watched the sunset. On Saturday we headed back to St. Vincent's Blue Lagoon with plenty of wind and exhilarating ride where waves crashed onto our saloon's front windows and hatch. Our best record for speed was made on a broad reach heading south to Tobacco Cays at slightly above 10 knots. The pre- and post- exploration of St. Vincent Island was also note worthy. We visited Fort Charlotte, currently a prison, and learned some local history. You can also see the shipyard that constructed the vessel in "Pirates of Caribbean". We also visited the Botanical Garden and the Montreal Garden, and enjoyed the various beautiful plant specimens collected by the two gardens. Great skippers, wonderful crews, beautiful scenery, exhilarating rides, good food, and most of all, great company, made the ingredients of a perfect vacation!
