April Racing Clinic: Tucker Thompson

Skipper Coordinator News

Ahoy SCOW members!

Last month we spent an exhausting evening listening to Matt drone on at the board meeting. Just kidding! Matt did no such thing. I, on the other hand, kept saying "I have another issue!!".

I do have some skipper news to make sure everyone is informed about:

Test Packets

If you wish to receive a test packet for the boats, you must submit a \$5 materials fee to pay for photocopying, supplies, etc. before receiving the test packet. This was recommended by the previous board because many people request the packet (where all the copying is done) and then never return the tests with a \$5 test fee.

Boating Safety Certificates

In 2001, the board made it a requirement that all people who certify as new skippers must have a Boating Safety Education Certificate (which is required for boaters on the river by DC law) on file with the Skipper Coordinator. THIS year, a motion was passed that requires ALL skippers to have a certificate on file before being allowed to renew their skippership next year (March 2003). Once I have most of the renewals done this year, I will start reminding those skippers that do not have one on file, to please provide one by the end of the year. The certificate can be obtained online at the BoatUS website for NO COST!!

Skipper Fees (part 1)

Half price skipper fees were approved by the board for those members who certify for the first time after October 1 AND members who RENEW their skippership after Oct 1.

Skipper Fees (part 2)

If you pay for skippering one class of boat (Scots or Cruisers) and you then CERTIFY after March 12, 2002 on the other class, throughout the 2002-2003 sailing season you will be eligible to pay the rest of the "BOTH" rate at the 2001-2002 fee schedule. This DOES NOT mean if you are already certified on both classes you can pay for only one class of skippership and then anytime later in the year RENEW at the previous year's fee schedule for the "BOTH" fee. In that case, you will have to pay the difference to the new "BOTH" rate. This motion affects "new certifiers" only, who are already certified on one class of boat and are waiting for the sailing season to certify on the other (especially since the cruisers have been out of commission).

Cruising Boat Exams

Cruising boat written exams that were taken and passed last summer expire at the end of this sailing season (March 2003). Written exams are to expire when the test is revised, as it was last August for the new engines. Those people who passed the exam last summer prior to August have this sailing season to complete their on-the-water checkout or they will have to take the new written exam.

Renewals

All skipper renewal forms have been sent out. If you did not receive one (I had to go off an old database of addresses and names), please let me know so that I can send you the forms.

Any wonder why the board meetings go so long???

Racing News - Spring Tune Up Regatta Bill Bernhards

SCOW's second annual Spring Tune Up Regatta will be held on Saturday, April 20, 2002. SCOW's two cruising boats will participate in this race as well as our Flying Scots. All other boat owners who wish to race are also invited.

SCOW's cruising boats and Flying Scots for the regatta will be awarded by lottery at the April 8th members meeting. To qualify for the cruising boats you must be a cruising boat skipper and already have passed SCOW's racing test. To qualify for the Scots you must be a Scot skipper. Skippers will choose their own crews.

The first step to race is to sign up. To do this just e-mail the racing director at race@scow.org before April 8th, or be at the members meeting on April 8th. There will be a \$10.00 skippers fee for this regatta.

Skippers will get a free Tune Up Regatta T-shirt. If your crew wants to buy a shirt, the cost is \$10.00 per shirt. Even if you don't race, you can still purchase a SCOW Regatta T-shirt. E-mail race@scow.org for purchasing information.

All race skippers will have a chance to win a special prize from Sailnet.com. Cape Cod Cruise

Plans for the Cape Cod Cruise are beginning to shape up as Mike Geissinger and I continue to prepare our boats and start making more concrete plans. The logistical details of organizing such a trip can be daunting. Both Mike and I have lists, but we're reluctant to share them lest we feel either superior that we are so far ahead of the other, or depressed that we are so far behind. (Don't tell Mike, but I've got roughly 115 things to take care of and have already finished 32. Only 83 to go!)

As you'll see elsewhere in this newsletter, we'll be discussing our preparations at the April membership meeting. These efforts cover everything from planning routes and selecting marinas for drop-off points to checking anticipated weather (Mike found a website that reported that average temperature lows in Cape Cod will be around 50F and highs, around 70F), upgrading first aid kits, checking bilge pumps, getting emergency gear, rewiring electrical circuits, installing new ports, checking fire extinguishers, caulking everything that might leak, and upgrading ground tackle, extending insurance coverage, and setting up e-mail communications via cell phone to be able to provide you daily progress reports on the SCOW website. Of all the preparations we will be making, none will be as important as those relating to safety. Both Mike and I will be taking the Safety at Sea Seminar at Annapolis in early April. As with all boating operations there are no guarantees that nothing will go wrong. All we can do is prepare as thoroughly as possible and, if something does run afoul, be prepared to deal with it.

Finding good crew is less of a problem because we have the highly talented and strongly motivated SCOW members as a resource. For example, Chris and Jane Farthing have already started to help me install new ports on DULCINEA. Later Mike and I will be sending out a general call for crew who will be coming on the cruise to scrub, sand, paint and polish. This will not only help us get the boats ready, it will also enable crew members to familiarize themselves with the boats on which they will be spending a lot of time (Chris and Jane will be the only crew lucky enough know that the thickness of the bulkhead in the V berth is 3/4", that in the main salon is 1", and that in the head is 1 ½").

By the time that you receive this newsletter, Mike and I will have made our preliminary crew selection, but that does not mean that we will not have members drop out for personal reasons or that we are not interested in additional crew. Come to the April meeting to hear our talk and, if you're interested in crewing, it's not too late to send us your name, address, phone numbers, sailing experience, and choice of leg (see the SCOW calendar of activities in May for details) by e-mail.

Rhode River Raft-up Details

I've consulted the charts. I've talked to the locals. I've formulated a plan. Well, actually I looked at a map, cornered Pat Derry in a bar, and now I'm winging it.

On Saturday, June 1, by 1400 hours (that's 2:00 pm for you civilian types), I will be anchored (weather permitting, but since all I have to do is motor about 1/4 mile, it shouldn't be a problem) at 76° 32.0′ W x 38° 53.2′ N. This is in the middle of the triangle formed by High Island and two others. I've been told that the way to get into the anchorage is to come into the Rhode River, pass south of High Island, and come around it into the protected area between the three islands.

Sea Frog is a white Cal 27 with a green stripe. I will be flying the largest SCOW burgee I can find. I will be monitoring channel 68 once I get the hook down. You can even call my cell phone (202-271-1238). (Unfortunately, I won't be able to receive e-mail on the boat.)
