The Sailor's Bookshelf

There quite a number of "how to" books on sailing. Unfortunately, the general books tend to give shallow coverage to many topics, while those on specific aspects of the sport tend to be quite narrow in scope.

On a recent trip to London, I wandered into a sailing shop and discovered a book I had not seen before, Glenan's Manual of Sailing (1995, David & Charles, 1132 pp.). This book is general, in that it covers the broad scope of sailing, including not only boat handling but also theory, navigation, weather, etc. Unlike most general books, though, it goes into great detail and gives lots of practical hints on every page. (A thousand pages of text and pictures will let you do that.) For example, there are eleven pages on tacking alone, discussing every step of the maneuver and the problems that can arise, and that is in addition to a separate chapter (50 pages) on boat control that addresses issues such as weight distribution and sail trim. Almost twenty pages are given to crew overboard techniques.

The book is put out by a French sailing school and is intended to accumulate various sailing techniques, rather than to advocate a single approach, as many books do. The translated version is published in London is available in the US from some specialty sailing sources (the Marine Education Textbooks Catalog at www.maritimeusa.com carries it) and, given its size, it is not

cheap (the same source lists it at \$67), but you may find it a useful addition to your sailing library.

P.S. And, for those looking for a general book that is cheaper, there evidently is a new addition of the Annapolis Book of Seamanship and I have spotted copies of the older edition for \$9.99 in the bargain pile at Crown Books!

Attention all SCOW Skippers. In early March you will receive your skipper renewal packet. You may renew at the Re-Up Brunch on Sunday, March 12 (look for me at the Skipper Renewal Table) or you may mail your completed form and your check to me.

Remember: Anyone who operates a boat must have a Safe Boating Certificate. Classes in Safe Boating are given by the Coast Guard Auxiliary (various locations) and by DC Harbor Police (550 Water St. SW, 202-727-4582). A test is given at the end of the series of classes and with a passing score, a Safe Boating Certificate is issued. If you do not wish to take the classes, you may take just the test (50 questions) from DC Harbor Police. I will have their study booklets available at the Re-Up Brunch.

SCOW skippers may sail all year long.
